# **Ropes Course Adventure for Mentors and Mentees**

or the fourth year in a row, mentors and mentees participated in an exciting new opportunity! This year, members of Mentor Tutor Connection's mentoring program engaged in a day of team building and ropes course. This was a new experience for most mentors and mentees. In an urban forest right in San Francisco, overlooking the Bay, 50 mentors and mentees gained trust, took risks, overcame fears, and had fun together.

The experience began on a beautiful spring day with lunch beneath a canopy of trees and time to meet and mingle with old and new friends from the mentoring program. After lunch, the challenges began -- easy at first and progressing to more difficult. Within the first hour, the group became comfortable acting silly, thinking quickly, and moving around as everyone played games. There were trust and get-to-know-each-other activities, all leading up to the time when the mentees and mentors could try the ropes course. Staring fifty feet up at the ropes and cables strung between trees, the group got their helmets and harnesses, and learned the safety procedures. Then it was time to choose which "element" to try first. Some chose to climb a tall

pole, stand on the top, and then jump off, all while attached to a harness and rope to allow a safe climb and smooth landing. Others climbed a tree, then traversed a cable between trees high overhead, and finished with a zip line to the ground. It was exciting to see how mentees and mentors cheered for each other and how mentees supported their mentors when they weren't sure they were ready to take on a challenge. The resounding report from the participants was fantastic!

# **Middle School Happenings**



he past year has been a year of growth and discovery for the Mentor Tutor Connection middle school tutoring program! Over the course of the year, I am pleased to report that tutor hours and students served increased significantly at Egan, Graham and Crittenden Middle Schools. Across our middle school sites, we broadened our reach by supporting students in a wide range of subjects including math, science, reading, social studies and English language development. Programs such as College Bound in the MVWSD and reading support programs in LASD provided new opportunities for our tutors to assist students. Over one third of our middle school tutors helped in these programs by facilitating weekly or bi-weekly small group discussions, allowing more individualized instruction during class.

Many learning opportunities were provided to maximize tutor impact and efficiency. Through "office hours" at local coffee shops, tutor luncheons, and our annual tutor and teacher surveys, we received valuable feedback on ways to improve our program. Top priorities identified include improving communication opportunities among teachers, tutors and staff, as well as increasing training opportunities and curriculum access.

We kicked off the 2018/19 school year with a roundtable discussion focused on "engaging reluctant learners" along with on-boarding meetings at each site to ensure that teachers are properly equipped to utilize our tutors' time and knowledge. We have also had the opportunity to introduce MTC at school staff meetings in an effort to increase awareness at our middle school campuses. I am confident that MTC will continue to expand our impact at all four middle school sites in the coming year.

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
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
