or the past three years, Ken Peters, a retired Internal Medicine physician and music enthusiast, has been a mentor with MTC, guiding his student, Pedro Alcazar. Paired with Pedro as a sophomore at Mountain View High School, Ken shared Pedro's passions for medicine and music.

Ken and Pedro enjoyed various activities together—hiking, movies, museums, and concerts—but their favorite moments were conversations over coffee.

Pedro's journey began in 6th grade when he moved from Mexico with very limited English. Fueled by a strong work ethic and "amazing social skills," says Ken, Pedro quickly overcame the language barrier and thrived in high school. Joining the mentor program, Pedro sought guidance amidst his uncertainty about the future.

Ken and Pedro enjoyed various activities together—hiking, movies, museums, and concerts—but their favorite moments were conversations over coffee. Pedro looked forward to these times, saying, "I always loved going out for coffee after a long day to debrief


Three years later, Pedro graduated with a string of accolades, including student government, the ELD Commissioner position, the Principal's Award, and scholarships. This fall, he'll pursue a Biology degree on the pre-med track at Loyola Marymount University.

"The most valuable lesson Ken taught me," Pedro says, "is to always give my best. Even if the outcome isn't what I expect, my hard work is something to be proud of".

Ken will continue to mentor Pedro from afar during college, confident that Pedro will achieve his dream of becoming a physician and is honored to be part of his journey.

TUTOR PROGRAM

MTC's Tutor Program supports over 200 K-8 students with one-on-one tutors in school classrooms and homework clubs. A significant proportion of MTC's tutored students lack access to personalized academic assistance through conventional means, having been identified for our program based on referral from teachers and school administrators due to their below grade level standards academic performance. Our tutors focus on math and language arts, aligning their efforts with the school district curriculum.

EMPOWERING YOUNG MINDS WITH LITERACY

Silke Gurlich

Silke moved to the US from Germany in 1967, teaching herself English and quickly becoming fluent. Her background in teaching helped her excel, leading her to a successful career in language education. After over 40 years running her own language school in Campbell, she joined MTC in 2016.

Silke's passion for teaching shines through her work with MTC. After struggling to find the right tutoring program to volunteer with, she discovered MTC's alignment with her teaching philosophy. "I like being helpful and making a difference," she says.

She understands the challenges children face, noting, "Even very smart kids who lack confidence or are told they make too many mistakes or are too slow, lose their path." One success story involved a student who progressed from reading at level B to level G by year's end, significantly boosting her confidence. Silke explains, "I love to help children learn to read because once they master reading, they can learn anything else."

One of Silke's favorite stories showcases her creative teaching approach. During a world history session, two 4th graders were struggling to understand a world map. To make the lesson engaging, Silke tapped into their interests. Knowing they loved soccer, she asked them to find Brazil, a country famous for its soccer stars, which sparked excitement. This led to even more curiosity with questions like "Where does the sun rise?" and "Where is the Golden Gate Bridge?" With their curiosity ignited, the students began to grasp their place in the world on a global scale.

Silke believes in the transformative power of literacy, stating, "When children can learn the sounds and names of letters and can blend and interchange them, that's when the magic happens." Her dedication continues to inspire and make a profound impact on young learners through MTC.


